NOVEMBER 21, 2019

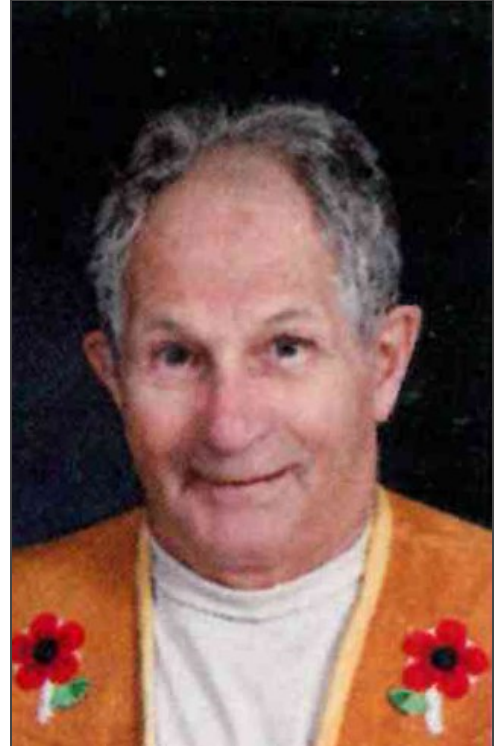
