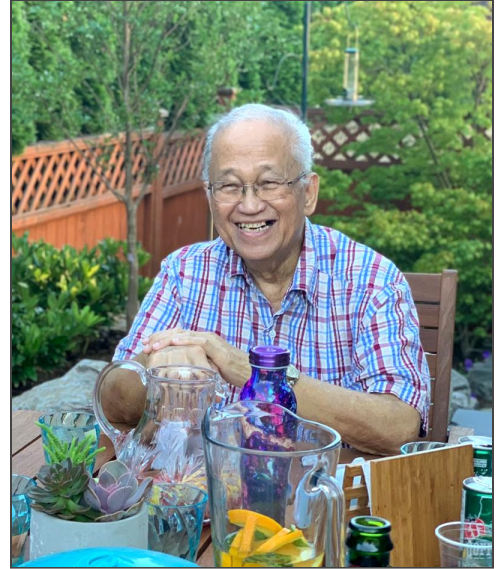


Wilfredo Consuelo Sismundo
